Multiply the number of pages you have to read by 5 minutes. That is the amount of time the average college student needs to spend on their reading assignment. Keep this in mind as you schedule time to do your reading. If you calculate four hours of reading, you might not want to read 7-11 p.m. straight through.

Colleges use abbreviations for departments, but often spell out entire course names. For example, your transcript might read in column format, "Fall 2014, PSY 101 -- Introduction to Psychology, ENG 121 -- English Composition, FRN 102 -- French II and ART 123 -- Art Appreciation."

Multiply the number of pages in your assignment by 5 minutes. This is the time it takes an average college student to read the pages of a textbook. Keep this in mind as you schedule time for your reading. For instance, if you have to read 73 pages for an assignment, that is 365 minutes, or approximately six hours of reading.

Read your transcript horizontally by class. Under the semester designation, you should see a list of course numbers. Read across the page horizontally. You will find all of the information for each course listed on this horizontal line. The course number tells you how the course appears in the catalog.

But most essays, especially academic essays, begin with a close reading of some kind of text—a painting, a movie, an event—and usually with that of a written text. When you close read, you observe facts and details about the text. You may focus on a particular passage, or on the text as a whole.
